This has created an interesting group of "spiritual but not religious" Christians who self-identify as Christian and say "faith is very important in my life"—but do not regularly attend church. Instead, they should be continually renewed by a pursuit of Christ and His Lordship. Envision that you are counseling with someone who is considering trusting Christ as his/her Savior. How would you describe the process of "putting off the old self"? What actions/disciplines/etc. would help this person be "renewed in the spirit of their minds" as they "put on the new self"?
- Read Ephesians 4:25-32. The love of God provides the model for individuals within the church to follow in their relationships with one another. Paul identifies five areas that pertain to growing disciples' relationships with one another.
 - 1) Do not use falsehood, but speak truth (4:25)
 - 2) Do use anger, but do not sin (4:26-27)
 - 3) Do not steal, but work to give to needy (4:28)
