But there are some common rationalizations to which we can all unconsciously fall prey. Once we recognize the dubious worth of these kinds of excuses, we can effectively influence the corporate moral climate... Codes of conduct function well when employees are confronted with straightforward issues or legal matters, such as whether a creditor may call late at night or whether individuals may use corporate property for personal use. They are less successful, though, when the issues are vague, novel, or difficult. In these cases, the FSG requires that employees be acquainted with the principles behind the rules, so they are able to discern what to do. Ethics training, then, should deal with both the corporate code of conduct and individual moral choices." —RANDY RICHARDS
